Governance review

We suggest that EXCO is obligated to increase the transparency of the organization and the accountability for those serving the ICF.

Motivation:

In a time where sports organizations face dire challenges and spectators, athletes, and even the highest authorities question the fairness and how trustworthy the international sports organization are, ICF needs to show its full commitment to a sport that is clean and sustainable in all manners.

The ICF needs to do this in a structured and measurable fashion in order to document both objectives and progress. Simply put, we must ensure that the ICF governance structure is “Fit for future”.

The EXCO should be in charge with the task:

Setting up a plan to improve ICF sports governance, setting specific goals from “basic good governance indicators” used in “the Sports Governance Observer” or similar objective and external measurements. The plan must cover 4 years. The EXCO must update the plan at regular intervals and inform the Congress of progress and setbacks.

NF input on Olympic matters

We suggest that the BOD must formulate a mandate concerning the Olympic disciplines for member federations to discuss prior to any discussion with the IOC concerning Olympic disciplines.

Motivation:

Olympic disciplines are fundamental to the ICF and its affiliated federations.

National Federations (NFs) require a clear and well-defined stance to engage in discussions effectively.

The ICF must maintain a robust and positive relationship with the IOC, aligning with the interests of the National Federations it represents.

By establishing a mandate before engaging in discussions with the IOC, the ICF ensures that these critical considerations are addressed, thereby presenting itself as both stronger and more transparent to the IOC.

The BoD is in charge with the task:

Presentation of mandate concerning the Olympic disciplines for member federation to discuss and approve.

The mandate must describe competition format, distances, gender and other sport specific elements.

This mandate must be secured prior to any discussion with the IOC concerning Olympic disciplines.
