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
What is Canoe Marathon?

Canoe Marathon is a paddling sport, raced on flatwater in which athletes paddle a kayak or canoe over a long distance to the finish line. During the race, athletes must tackle a series of portages where they must carry their boat over a section of land before returning to the water.

With courses created to be covered in laps with a number of portages (artificial or real), this format has developed to encourage a more spectator-friendly approach to the discipline.

Canoe Marathon is one of the three canoe disciplines featured at The World Games 2025, together with Dragon Boat and Canoe Polo. The discipline will be represented in two categories, both on kayak, in the short and long distance.

CANOE MARATHON



History

Competition in distance canoeing has a long history, with famous national races including the Sella Descent in Spain which was first held in 1929 and the Devizes to Westminster race in England that began in 1948. It was not until the 1960s that international competitions began to develop, and in 1975 the first steps were taken to have Canoe Marathon recognised by the ICF. It would be a further nine years until the ICF Congress in Sofia, Bulgaria, approved a separate committee for Canoe Marathon including the introduction of a World Championships.



Format

Short Distance

20 competitors are split into two groups of 10 per heat.

Five fastest competitors in each heat qualify for the finals.

Aditionally, the best five times of both heats qualify for the final.

The best three paddlers in the finals will receive gold, silver, and bronze medals.

Long Distance

There are no qualifying rounds for long distance. All competitors race in one event that is considered the final.

The best three paddlers will receive gold, silver, and bronze medals.

Major format changes since the previous TWG

At TWG 2013, Canoe Marathon took place as an invitational sport, thanks to the Host City in Cali, Colombia. Competitions were held in both boat classes - men's single canoe events as well as single and double kayak events for both genders were organised. In 2022, there were only kayak competitions, with women and men starting in individual events, over short and long distance.

Rundown of competition

In the short distance, all athletes line up at the start line and use a stationary start. In the long distance, all boats start at the same time. Athletes alternate paddling with their boat on water and portaging their boat on land.

The short distance will be 3.4km and will have two portages. The distance is composed of two small laps (1km) including two portages. The last lap is slightly shorter.

The long distance will be 21km and will have eight portages. The distance is composed of 10 big laps (2km) including eight portages (no portages in the first two laps), and a small lap (1km) at the end.

The boats have finished the race when their bows cross the finish line, with the athlete in the boat.

Field of play

The water and racecourse are not subject to prescribed standards. It can be a combination of river, lake, estuary and sea. Red coloured buoys are placed in the water as obstacles to navigate around on the kayak. For The World Games, the following describe the course:

Short distance will be about 3.4km and will have two portages of 80m to 100m. Laps are approximately 1.2km in length, including two portages. The first portage is after about 1 km. Distances between the turns are approximately 500m.

Long distance will be about 21km and will have eight portages. Laps are approximately 2km in length, and portages are 60m long with pontoons in and out as well as a portage on a concrete path. At the end of the competition, a small lap of approximately 1km is added.



Penalties and disqualifications

Start; second warning 30 seconds penalty, third warning disqualification.

Missing a buoy = 15 seconds penalty.

Collison, with minor disadvantage 30 seconds, if given another paddler major disadvantage disqualification.

If an athlete is observed by an international official throwing a drink bag into the water, they will receive a 30 second penalty.

Time penalties must be executed in the penalty zone at the portage.

All penalties or disqualifications must be confirmed by the Competition Committee in writing immediately, given the reason.

Protests and appeals

Team Leaders or other NF representatives have the right to appeal to the Jury against a decision of the Competition Committee on behalf of their athletes.

The appeal in writing, must be handed to the Competition Committee for the attention of the Chair of the Jury, not later than 20 minutes after the Team Leader is called to attend the Competition Committee to receive the written disqualification.

What is Dragon Boat?

Dragon Boat is a race over a clearly defined unobstructed course in the shortest possible time. There are two classes that compete in this discipline, 10-seater and 8-seater referring to the number of paddlers in the boat.

Paddlers sit in twos side-by-side and use a single-bladed paddle. Both classes will also have a drummer and a steerer, with everybody in the boat paddling to the rhythm of the drum.

Dragon Boat was an invitational sport at The World Games 2005 in Duisburg, Germany and the 2009 edition in Kaohsiung, Chinese Taipei. For the first time, it will be an official medal event at The World Games 2025 in Chengdu.

DRAGON BOAT

History

Dragon Boat has ancient Chinese origins and dates back more than 2,500 years. The first participants were Chinese villagers who held races on the fifth day of the fifth lunar month of the Chinese calendar in the belief it would show worship to the dragon, a traditional symbol of water in Asia, and so encourage the rains needed for prosperity and to avert misfortune.

Dragon Boat took on further prominence following the death of great poet Qu Yuan in 278 BC. He committed suicide in the Miluo River protesting against corruption. Locals went in their fishing boats to try and save him and beat drums and splashed oars in the

water to keep fish away from his body. His death is marked by a Dragon Boat Festival (Duanwu Festival) each year.

Dragon boats are designed to resemble the classic dragon that had the head of an ox, antler of a deer, mane of a horse, body of a python, claws of a hawk, and fins and tail of a fish, so the bow is crafted as the head of a dragon with the stern as the tail, the hull painted with scales and the paddles symbolically representing the claws. Modern Dragon Boat is generally recognised as having its origins in the Hong Kong International Races, first held in 1976.

Format

Dragon Boats must be propelled solely by means of a single-bladed paddle and paddled in a sitting position.

For 200m and 500m races, the division of the boats into heats should be determined by drawing lots. Teams will be divided into heats and go through progression. The racecourse must be straight and in one direction. There must be at least six lanes.

The 2000m race is a pursuit race where the boats start one by one according to the boat numbers at intervals of 10 seconds between each other. The course is circular with movement direction "anticlockwise". There should be two turning points: one (1) – in the finish line zone, and the other – in the 500m mark zone. The start and finish of the race should be in front of the finish tower.

Rundown of competitions

Each crew must arrive at least five minutes prior to the starting time in the range of vision and earshot of the Starter. On his/her instructions, the crew must bring the boat to the starting position. The starting command will be "Attention -Go" (or shot or a loud sound).

200m and 500m races

The division into heats should be made in accordance with the Dragon Boat competition rules which state that the division of boats into heats should be determined by drawing lots or by ICF World Ranking. In relation to the progression plan, the boats from each heat go forward to the next appropriate phase of the competition. The others are eliminated. The distribution of lanes for semi-finals and finals is automatically determined by the results of the previous races in accordance with the "Division System - Plan B, SF-B1".

Crews will line up at the start line in six lanes. If a crew for technical reasons is not ready for the start, the drummer must signal this by waving both arms with the drumming sticks. Beginning to paddle prior to the start command is considered to be a false start. In case of a false start, the Starter must immediately give a loud buzzer sound signal.

Once the start has commenced, the crews must keep in the centre of the lanes. The crew will be called twice and then finally be warned if a strong deviation from the course occurs. If the team does not correct the course after the final warning, the respective team may be disqualified by the Competition Committee after receiving the respective report by the Course Umpire. A crew must conduct and finish its race in the same lane in which it started. During the race the drummer must actively beat the drum.

2000m pursuit race

The starting order is as per the starting list. The division of the boats into heats should be determined by drawing lots or by the ICF World Ranking. The start number of the boat must be shown in a clearly visible place near the starting area. The boats start at 10 second intervals. If a boat does not start, its starting number will also be shown. The Starter has got to count down as per the normal sequence. The next boat must start after two x 10 seconds intervals. The Starter must speak in a loud voice the countdown and starts the boat all 10th seconds with a "GO" (or shot or loud sound). If the boat has already crossed the start line with 1% to 50% of its length at the moment of the "GO" command, the crew is penalised with 10 seconds additional time. If the boat has already crossed the start line with more than 50% of its length at the moment of the "GO" command, the crew is penalised with 30 seconds additional time. If the boat has already crossed the start line with more than 100% of its length at the moment of the "GO" command, the crew will be disqualified.

For all distances, the boat has finished the race when its dragonhead crosses the finish line with all crew members in it. The Finish Line Judges will determine the result of the competition based on the order of the boats arriving. The crossing of the finish line must be signalised by an acoustic signal. The correct race will be confirmed by the Course Umpires by raising a white flag. The incorrect race will be signalised by the red flag.

Major rule changes since the previous TWG

The open crew can be composed of both male and female athletes.

Field of play

Both the start and finish lines must be marked with red flags and red buoys at the points where lines intersect the outer limits of the course.

The start and finish lines must be at right angles to the course. In the 200m and 500m races, the lanes must be marked with buoys or floats.

The distance between the buoys cannot be more than 25m.

The last buoys must be marked from number one (1) to six (6) and zero (0).

The numbering goes from the left to the right with the number placed on the buoy in such a way as to be clearly visible from the finish tower.

The numbered buoys (white cubes with black numbers on them) should be fixed no closer than 1m and no further than 2m behind the finish line. The numbered buoys must be clearly visible to the athletes and to be on the corresponding athlete's right-hand side as they pass it. There must be an automatic start machine or start pontoons with assistants to hold the boats. Alternatively, there may be cords fixed on starting pontoons for steerers to hold on before the start.

The steer has the duty to check in the marshalling area prior to the race the rudder-paddle and the helm of the boat. Any damage must be reported to the Chief Boat Marshal. The athletes in each team must wear the same uniform.



Penalties and disqualifications

False start for 200m and 500m races: the Starter must identify the offending crew(s) making the false start and give them a warning. In case of a second false start by the same crew, the boat will be disqualified (DSQ) from the race and must leave the starting area and the course immediately.

False start for 2000m races: If the boat has already crossed the starting line with 1% to 50% of its length at the moment of the "GO" command, the crew is penalised with 10 seconds additional time. If the boat has already crossed the starting line with more than 50% of its length in the moment of the "GO" command, the crew is penalised with 30 seconds additional time. If the boat has already crossed the starting line with more than 100% of its length at the moment of the "GO" command, the crew will be disqualified.

Protests and appeals

A protest against the right of a crew to compete in a race must be addressed to the Chief Official and handed to the Competition Committee, no later than one hour before the start of the first race of the competition. A protest made during a competition must be in written form, addressed to the Chief Official and handed to the Competition Committee.

If the protest is against a decision of the Competition Committee, the protest must be received no later than 20 minutes after the decision has been published on the athletes' area noticeboard with the exact time of publication.

The Competition Committee must note the time that the decision has been published at athlete's area noticeboard on the written disqualification. All protests must be accompanied by a fee of 75 Euros (or an equal sum in the local currency). The fee will be refunded if the protest is upheld. When a protest or a report is made against an athlete or a team, the Team Leader of the athlete/team in question should be presented with the protest or report to read.

Team Leaders or other NF representatives have the right to appeal to the Jury against a decision of the Competition Committee on behalf of their athletes. The appeal must be handed to the Chair of the Jury in writing with reasons, no later than 20 minutes after the decision has been published on the athletes' area noticeboard with the exact time of publication. An appeal must be accompanied by a fee of 75 Euros (or an equal sum in the local currency). The fee will be refunded if the appeal is upheld. The appeal must be heard as soon as possible. Witnesses may be called. The decision of the Jury is final.

CANOE POLO

What is Canoe Polo?

Canoe Polo is a dynamic team sport contested on open water or in a swimming pool with two teams of five. It combines paddling and ball handling skills within a contact team game. The ball can be thrown by hand or flicked with the paddle to pass between players and shoot at the goal.

The aim of the teams is to score more goals than the opponent in order to win the game. Goals are scored by shooting the ball into the opponent's goal.

History

Canoe ball games have been played in Great Britain since the late 19th century and early forms of Canoe Polo were played in the United States and parts of Europe into the first half of the 20th century.

A national championships in Canoe Polo was first held in England in 1971, but it was not until 1986 that the ICF published its first set of universal playing rules for the discipline.

The following year Canoe Polo was demonstrated at the Canoe Sprint World Champion-ships in Duisburg, Germany, and in 1990 the ICF finalised its international rules for Canoe Polo. The first Canoe Polo World Championships took place in Sheffield, England, in 1994, and consisted of 18 men's teams and six women's teams. Australia beat Germany in both the men's and women's finals. The event is held every two years and continues to grow.

Format

There will be two groups of four teams, with single round-robin games in both groups. All teams will qualify for crossed quarter-finals.

Losing quarter-finalists match-up in a consolation round. Winners of the consolation round compete for fifth position, losing teams compete for seventh. Winners of the quarter-finals qualify for the semi-finals. Losing semi-finalists compete for bronze. Winning semi-finalists compete for gold and silver.

Rundown of competition

Two halves of 10 minutes are played per game. At the beginning of each half, players from each team line up to start, stationary, with some part of their kayaks on their own goal line. Only one player per team sprints to the middle of the pitch to win possession of the ball.

Players are allowed to possess the ball for a maximum of five seconds before passing or shooting, or the team will lose ball possession. The ball can be controlled by hand or by paddle.

There are no traditional, fixed goalkeepers. The defending team positions one athlete under the goal and is considered as a goalkeeper. While contact is allowed elsewhere on the pitch during ball possession, goalkeepers can't be moved or pushed out of their position by any opposition player.

In case of a tie, five minutes of overtime are played consecutively until a team scores a goal. The first team to score a goal in an overtime period wins the game.

Field of play

Canoe Polo is played either indoors in swimming pools or outdoors on a pitch measuring 35m by 23m. The boundaries of the pitch are marked by floating ropes or, for smaller venues, pool edges.

The goals are located 2m above the water level on the end of each zone. The area approximately 6m in front of each goal can be defined as the zone in which defending players create formations to defend the goal from attackers. The field has marked areas for coaches and referees.

Each team has five players in-pitch and up to three substitutes behind the goal.



Penalties and disqualifications

Free shot after a goal 4m penalty for special fouls

A player receiving their first (green) or second (yellow) sanction card is excluded from the field of play and cannot be replaced for a maximum period of two minutes.

If a goal is scored by the opposition during a power play, the excluded player or a team-mate can return to the field of play and general play will resume with a centre restart.

A player receiving their third (red) sanction card is excluded from the field of play and cannot be replaced for two minutes.

Direct red card = out of match + next game. The Jury can decide additional sanctions.

Protests and appeals

The decision of a referee is final.

A team leader can use a protest template.

The decision of the Jury is final for this event.





The Opening Ceremony of TWG 2025 Chengdu will commence at 20:00 at the "Tianfu Roof" of Tianfu International Convention Center in Sichuan Tianfu New Area. The ceremony is scheduled to last approximately 90 minutes.

The Closing Ceremony will be held at 20:00 at the Chengdu International Friendship Pavilion, Chengdu World Horticultural Expo Park, with an estimated duration of 60 minutes.

Xinglong Lakeside Venue Center




Located on the west bank of Xinglong Lake in Chengdu, the Xinglong Lakeside Venue Center will host Canoe Marathon and Dragon Boat races.

The competition area extends adjacent to the shoreline.



Jianyang Cultural and Sports Center



As a core venue of The World Games 2025, Canoe Polo matches will be held at the Jianyang Cultural and Sports Center. It covers an area of 40,000 square metres, with a multi-functional gymnasium, swimming pool, national fitness center and outdoor sports park. The swimming pool will host Canoe Polo games.




Main Media Center

The Main Media Center (MMC) is located in the West Financial Innovation Center Cluster in Chengdu Eastern New Area, and will provide accredited media with all kinds of facilities and services necessary for their coverage of TWG 2025 in Chengdu.

Outside the MMC, a dedicated media transportation hub will be established, connecting the Tianfu International Hotel Complex, the officially recommended hotel for media, and the media centres at competition venues. The MMC will officially operate from 4 to 17 August 2025.

The MMC covers an area of about 20,000 square metres, consisting of the Main Press Center (MPC) and the International Broadcast Center (IBC). The MPC is located in Building 1 (1F and 2F) and the Conference Center, covering an area of about 11,000 square metres. The IBC is located in Building 7 (1F-3F), covering an area of about 6,000 square metres. In addition, there is a 2,000-square-metre space, mainly used for the construction of the City Hall, where cultural events and interactive activities can be held.







Venue media centres

The Venue Media Centres (VMCs) will operate during the operation period of the corresponding competition venues. Each VMC is generally open 1 hour before the first competition in the competition venue and will close 1.5 hours after the last competition in the competition venue. The closing time may be postponed due to delays caused by competitions, award ceremonies, and press conferences.

In principle, the following operational areas will be set in each VMC: a media work-room, media tribunes, a press conference room, a mixed zone, photo positions, and an official information service office, all of which are managed and coordinated by the venue media manager.

Media catering services


Free refreshments and drinking water will be provided at the Main Media Center (MMC) and competition venues according to the competition schedule and at the venues of the Opening and Closing Ceremonies on the day when the Opening/Closing Ceremony is held.

Paid buffet-style lunch and dinner will be offered to accredited media at the MMC, and paid meals will be provided at official media hotels and also at the competition venues as per the competition schedule.

INFO system

The INFO System will be open to all accredited media three days before TWG 2025 Chengdu. It will provide free official information services, including text and pictures.

Arrival and departure transportation services

Based on submitted media arrival and departure information and accommodation information, Chengdu ExCo will provide 24-hour transportation services between the Official Points of Arrival and Departure (Tianfu International Airport, Shuangliu International Airport, Chengdudong Railway Station) and all official accommodation sites.

05:00-24:00: with a frequency of every 40 minutes; 00:00-5:00: with a frequency of every 90 minutes.

Tianfu International Airport - Grand Mercure Chengdu East

05:00-24:00: with a frequency of every 40 minutes; 00:00-5:00: with a frequency of every 90 minutes.

Shuangliu International Airport

- Grand Mercure Chengdu East - Tianfu International Hotel Complex

05:00-24:00: with a frequency of every 40 minutes; 00:00-5:00: with a frequency of every 90 minutes.

Chengdudong Railway Station

- Grand Mercure Chengdu East - Tianfu International Hotel Complex 00:00-24:00: on an on-demand basis.

Games-time shuttle services

TM bus stations are set up at the Main Media Center and TWG Village Zone B, offering shuttle services between the Main Media Center and competition venues in Tianfu New Area, Longquanyi (excluding Qinglonghu Wetland Park), Eastern New Area and Jianyang Venue Clusters; between TWG Village Zone B and competition venues in High-tech Zone, Wuhou, Jinniu, Xindu and Longquanyi (Qinglong Lake Park only) Venue Clusters.

The first shuttle will arrive at a given competition venue 30 minutes before the first competition, and the last shuttle will depart from the competition venue 90 minutes after the last competition ends. During its remaining operational period, the shuttle will operate with a departure interval of 30 minutes during peak hours and 60 minutes during off-peak hours.

Shuttle service will be available between Tianfu International Hotel Complex and MMC, operating daily from 06:00 to 23:00 with rolling departures. The shuttle services will have a departure interval of 10 minutes during peak hours and 45 minutes during off-peak hours.

Athlete or player	Male or female athlete. In Canoe Polo refer to a player.		
Gender	Men or Women		
Boat/board	A boat/board is the watercraft used to practice canoeing (e.g., canoe, kayak, SUP): • A single boat/board: a boat/board with only one (1) place for an athlete (e.g. kayak single); • A crew boat/board: a boat/board with more than one (1) place for an athlete (e.g. canoe four).		
Age group	e.g., junior, under 21, under 23, masters depending on each discipline		
Category	A category is defined by a boat/board and a gender (e.g., Men Kayak, Mixed Canoe).		
Class	A class is defined by a category and the number of places in a boat/board (e.g., men kayak double; women canoe four).		
Event	An event is a contest in one (1) discipline resulting in the award of medals. An event is defined by at least a class and depending on the competition and the discipline with the additional optional information: a distance and / or an age group (e.g., junior men's kayak double 500m, under 23 women's kayak single, men's canoe double classic).		
Type of event	 Individual events: A boat/board comprised of one (1) or more athletes competing against other boats/boards. Team events: two (2) or more boats/boards competing together against other teams. 		
Event Phase	A stage of competition (e.g., preliminaries, heats, semifinal, final).		
Groups	Denoting one section (usually 5-10 athletes) that paddle in reverse ranked sequence for each run in a phase.		
Run or race or match	The basic unit of an event phase (e.g., heats 1st run, semifinal, final).		
Competition programme	The list of events included in a competition.		
Competition schedule	The complete list of events and their different phases with the time at which they will be held.		
International Technical Official	Oversee the operation of the competition.		
Host Organising Committee	The host organising committee can be a National Federation or a subsidiary or a third party organisation specialising in competition management.
